
## Henrietta Marcotte "the Traveling Trunk Lady" Retires By Roberta Zentner

After nearly ten years as the chairman of the Traveling Trunk Committee, Henrietta Marcotte has decided to retire. She will be sorely missed by everyone involved in the education outreach program, especially the thousands of children that she delighted with her tales of years gone by. Ask any third grader what a calf weaner looks like or what "easy Pees" are and they will know the answer because Henrietta told them.

Henrietta has been a walking history of Cupertino for many years. She was born in Cupertino in 1911 and ever since then she has been its greatest fan. "Her wonderful memory of who lived where and all about the early days is a boon to the Historical Society." For seven years prior to her career as "Traveling Trunk Lady" she wrote ROOTS articles in the *Cupertino Scene*. While she was busy researching and writing those articles she helped make the Cupertino Historical Society and Museum the success it is today. She was and still is involved in all aspects of the Society. We sincerely thank you, Henrietta for all that you have given us.

## **Annual Exhibit Opens at** the Quinlan Gallery

To Have and To Hold: The Story of Cupertino from the Museum's Collection is a very special exhibit. While other exhibitions in the past have focused on a particular theme such as Women of Cupertino or From the Ground Up: How Business grew in Cupertino, To Have and To Hold departs from the typical thematic approach. This exhibition will be launched on one main premise: that each person has a story to tell.

About a year and a half ago the museum was given a very special gift of Jeannie Ryder's beautiful costume collection by Ham Ryder. At that time I talked with our curator John Handley, and expressed a wish to display the collection. Our new exhibit took shape from that conversation last year.

The idea that the museum collects things is often misunderstood, particularly for a local history museum. A museum is as concerned with the story and the history as it is with thingsthings are the very means by which it captures and presents the history and the story in an understandable way. If this premise is true-then the reason that people make donations of objects to the Museum is, in essence, to preserve and include in the collective history, a piece of themselves-a bit of their own story. When we look at the beautiful bed donated by the Picchetti family, (on permanent display at the Vallco Satellite Museum) we are looking at more than a piece of old furniture; we are looking at a slice of history—their history—a story of an Italian family that immigrated here, and worked hard to make this place their home. And now, years later, one of the few remnants of this story is a bed, their tangible contribution to the collective story of Cupertino.

This is just one example of the collection following our mission, i.e. The Cupertino Historical Society and Museum is dedicated to ensuring that the heritage of Cupertino stays alive for all to understand and share, and for all to feel that this heritage is their heritage.

This year, our exhibit has taken on a new Thanks to Charlie Liggett, we have six custom built platforms for displaying our objects. One of the most attractive features of these platforms is their secondary use as storage. All museums are plagued with storage problems, therefore our new platforms, designed by John Handley, will partially solve that problem.




