Fields of Dreams Luncheon an Extraordinary Success.

A special luncheon honoring the pioneering women of Cupertino, past and present was held March 15, celebrating the opening of *The Fields of Dreams* exhibit. Kathy Nellis, and her committee, Sharon Blaine and Barbara Rogers worked together to give the community an event for which the Society and Museum may take pride.

"Women of our past met the same basic demands of life in ways that differ from, but morror, our lives today. Technology has changed the tools we use, but not the functions. We are creating history in our movements in the world; let us mark our own achievements and recognize our progress, as we see the closeness of our connection to the past."

The program West Side's Living Treasures featured three west side natives who spoke about their female relatives: mothers, grandmothers, and aunts. Barbara Baggerly, a relative of Cora Baggerly Older by marriage, gave personal insights into Cora Older's later life. Barbara spent many busy hours with Cora over the years. Beez Jones talked about her mother and grandmother Glendenning sharing their contributions to life in Cupertino. Mathilda Marani Sousa spoke of her mother and the love story of her mother and father Our speakers held the audience spellbound. The Mariani family is one of the families featured in the exhibit.

We were fortunate to have photographs of each of the women discussed inside the Cupertino Room, and photographs of our own successful women, Lauralee Sorensen, and Barbara Kopple, on the entry table. Anna Eshoo had planned on attending, but was delayed. Her representative, Sallie Bennett, was welcomed.

Henrietta Marcotte, keeper of the *traveling trunk*, showed her artifacts and objects pertaining early women on a table just outside the dining room.

The delightful event ended with all the natives of the West Side and Cupertino standing and being acknowledged by those present.


The nominating committee is in full swing. The Society will be selecting six new members, among them a secretary and treasurer. Please give any input to me or the museum staff.


